YEAR 7 TRANSITION CAMP

Wambangalang Environmental Studies Centre: 7-8 March 2024



Year 7 students, mentored by Years 10 and 11 students, attended a transition camp at Wambangalang Environmental Studies Centre last week.

Students participated in orienteering, board games, rope activities, digital woodlands nature photos, archery, dip netting, bike riding, initiative games and a nature show.

Students demonstrated their communication and organisational skills across the broad range of activities and worked as a team in the various challenges. They bonded on the low ropes and found many little fish and micro bugs while dip netting. They fed the invasive mosquito fish species to a native cod, while being able to touch or get up close to reptiles such as Gary the Snake, stumpy the Blue Tongued Lizard and Sandy the Bearded Dragon.

The annual camp is a wonderful opportunity for students commencing their first year of high school to bond in the great outdoors.

ROAD SAFETY EDUCATION DAY

Students in Years 11/12 attended a one-day road safety workshop in Orange last Wednesday.

The RYDA Program, held at Towac Park, is coordinated by the Rotary Clubs of Orange, local police and other organisations. Students attended six 30-minute workshops including Road Choices, The I in Drive, Mind Matters, Crash Investigations, Drive SOS, and Speed and Stopping.

Students learnt about the dangers of phones and fatigue whilst driving, personal risk factors, how feelings can or cannot support your driving, the impact of crashes on lives, and how to stay safe on the roads. Students also learnt about stopping distances. For example, the stopping distance at 40km/hour for a car is 27

metres. At 60km/hour, the stopping distance is 56m...and the faster you go, the longer it takes to stop. All the students had an informative day and asked a variety of questions to increase their awareness about important road safety issues.
